- Children's Day : Each year, Koreans celebrate Children's Day on May  $5^{\text{th.}}$  This holiday was first introduced by the Korean novelist, Bang Jeong-hwan, in 1922 to promote children's right and happiness. During the Japanese occupation of Korea, celebrations ceased for a while. After the liberation of Korea in 1946, the holiday celebrations restarted and was moved from May 1<sup>st</sup> to May 5<sup>th.</sup>

- Parents' Day : Initially celebrated as Mother's Day in 1956, the holiday was later changed to parents day in 1973. Parents day is a holiday where Koreans honor their parents and grandparents; it is celebrated on May 8<sup>th</sup>.

- **Teachers' Day** : Teachers' Day was designated as a national commemoration day in 1963, to show respect to teachers for their contributions. Initially celebrated in May 26<sup>th</sup>, it was later changed to May 15<sup>th</sup>. The change was done in order to commemorate the birth of King Sejong the Great, whom is considered as a great educator in Korean history.
